Activity 5.2: Current Practices in Shared Decision-Making Time: 25 minutes

Purpose

To discuss practices that engage families in shared decision-making opportunities and determine if additional strategies are needed and/or if next steps needed to enhance shared decision-making in your school/district.

Materials Needed

• Question Matrix (see attached)

Roles

- I. Facilitator: Explain the activity and lead the follow-up discussion.
- 2. Participants: Work in small groups to discuss various strategies to engage families in shared decision-making.

Activity

- 1. Ask participants to count off 1-6 to form smaller subgroups to work on the task.
- 2. Ask each group to review the shared decision-making strategies and discuss the current status of each. Additionally, ask the groups to consider if additional strategies are needed and/or next steps needed to enhance shared decision-making in your school/district.
- 3. Ask one person from each group to be prepared to serve as the reporter during the debriefing.
- 4. Bring the group together to share and discuss what was written on the charts. Each group should report out by sharing 1-2 ideas that were listed for next steps.
- 5. The facilitator should capture key concepts on the facilitator debriefing worksheet as appropriate.
